June 3rd - Janai Luwum, Archbishop of Uganda, martyr (d 1977)

Janani Luwum was born in a small Ugandan village in 1922 and is now seen as one of the most influential leaders of the modern church in Africa. He trained as a teacher and possessed uncommon leadership and negotiation skills.

Two years after Bishop Luwum's consecration, Idi Amin staged a coup and took over the Ugandan Government. The reign of Idi Amin is seen as one of the most brutal of all African dictators in modern history, one marred by immense suffering, violence and abuses of human rights.

Archbishop Luwum was a frequent visitor to Idi Amin, delivering letters of protest against the arbitrary killings and disappearances, so by 1977 President Amin had begun to see the church as an enemy of the state, and Bishop Luwum one of the main leaders.

In early February 1977, the tension between Idi Amin and Archbishop Luwum rose to an extreme level. Archbishop Luwum was accused of plotting with the former president to overthrow the government.

The President wanted to see him alone. What happened next is a matter of conjecture and speculation. Early the next morning the government released a statement that Bishop Luwum and two senior government officials had crashed their car while trying to escape. Bishop Luwum's body was sent to his home village of Mucwini for burial. He was survived by wife Mary Lawinyo Luwum and nine children.






The St Barnabas Anglican Church, Julia Creek, was erected about 1930.







We have been rehearsing since August 2021, to finally perform last month in April.



School chaplaincy – SU QLD

PRISION CHAPLAIN TRAINING DAY



Chaplain Ed Spriggins and Trainee Chaplains Bernice Good Chew, Neil Bruce and Leigh Kennedy attended the State Chaplaincy Training in Cairns early this month. There was also good roll up from the combined churches chaplaincy team from Townsville.

The Uniting Church manages chaplaincy in Queensland as Correction Services only wants to deal with one body for chaplaincy. The State Chaplaincy Board comprises board members from the churches that provide chaplains. We also met with our Anglican board member Sue Barker who is currently the minister of Childers Anglican parish. The conference dinner on Friday night was a good feed where we were able a to meet other chaplains and chat

Saturday was a full on day of training. For many of the "old hands" there may not have been anything that new but for those new to prison chaplaincy there was a lot of useful information and tips. I actually took notes which is something I have not done since university days.

We learnt that it means a lot to prisoners that we are not being paid, don't have to be there and have given up our time to visit them especially as some prisoners never get a visit from family or friends. It was shared that the psalms are often the best place to start to deal with prison issues as they provide a scriptural base for dealing with prisoner's issues and for prayer with them. We also need to remember that all things are possible with God.

Cultivating trust is a key people skills competency. Extending trust involves risk and we need to keep anything said confidential. However we were reminded that there is a fine line between things said in confidence and reporting abuse and self harm. The session on our obligations and reporting abuse and self harm were confronting especially for people like me who grew up in safe Christian families with both parents at the helm. The contrast from my world experience to most prisoner's world experience is marked. It shows how much church values, Christian values, a good home and education provide the platform for a good life and the stark reality that most prisoners do not have this basic platform to rebuild on that we take for granted.

So the take away from the training is that the only way forward is Jesus. We as chaplains can't do this ministry in our own strength. No one person has the extensive skill set required to minister to prisoners. Only the Lord's transforming power can heal the prisoner and the circumstances that landed them in prison. Prison ministry is all about what the Lord is doing and letting him do the leading and not me. Just being there despite our inadequacies is what makes it all happen.

"Most people think they are all bad people, but when you sit down with people and talk to people you find out that most people have a good heart.

"It's just that they've run into bad times and they just need someone to love them and that's what I find out with a lot of prisoners – they never had that love."



Would you know if God was trying to communicate with you? Can you tell if the Holy Spirit is giving you a nudge? And how could you be sure that it was *really* God and not just your own ego sending a message?

We may have learned a lot *about* God over the years, through Bible study, worship, sermons, Lenten studies and the like. And that's obviously vital for our Christian faith. But, it seems to me, that the church has often been less successful in helping us build a *relationship* with God, a friendship with our Creator, a friendship that involves two-way communication. And that's where *Spiritual Direction* can help.

The ministry of *Spiritual Direction* has a long and respected tradition in the Christian church. It has enjoyed something of a revival over recent decades. Townsville has been very much part of that revival, with the House of Prayer offering spiritual direction for over 40 years.

So what actually happens in a spiritual direction session? The director, who has specific training for this ministry, and the directee meet in a comfortable, confidential space. The director encourages the directee to reflect on the everyday happenings of their life - the highs, the lows, the joys, the challenges. The director listens - and listens some more. The director guides the directee to become more attentive to the presence of the sacred in their daily life. Most sessions are for about an hour. Anyone can "try" a one-off session, others choose to meet with their director on an on-going basis.

The word "direction" can be a bit off-putting. It sounds as if the director is telling the directee what to do, which couldn't be further from the truth. Spiritual direction is not counseling and it's not therapy. Put simply, someone who seeks spiritual direction recognizes that they are on a journey and wants to talk to a fellow believer along the way — and if that person is trained in spiritual direction, so much the better.

In my ignorance, I used to think spiritual direction was only for ordained clergy — or perhaps someone in a spiritual crisis. But I've discovered that it's for anyone. Anyone wanting to deepen their relationship with the Mystery we call God, anyone wanting to find God in their lives. It's not just for "religious" people, spiritual direction can be for all of us.

"God comes to us disguised as our life." Spiritual Direction helps to reveal this truth to us all.
