## December 21<sup>st</sup> St Thomas

#### **St Thomas Anglican Church Hughenden**

The first recorded services were held in 1883 and in 1885 Bishop Stanton dedicated the Parish Church of St Thomas. This church was demolished in 1949 by a cyclone.

• The origins of the Hughenden parish of the Church of England are closely bound up warn the first settlement of the district, particularly with Mr. Robert Gray, who gained control of Hughenden Station from Henry in 1865. Gray's wife was a daughter of the first Anglican Dean of Goulburn.

• In his "Reminiscences of India and North Queensland" Gray recalls that the first cleric to visit Hughenden was Reverend James Hassall, a priest from the Dioceses of Sydney. He had come north to dispose of some cattle which he and his brother owned. While in the district he held two services for the Grays and their employees at Hughenden Station homestead.

• The next visit by an Anglican minister was not until 1871 when Reverend J Adams who was attached to the Townsville parish held services at Hughenden Station.

• A Foundation stone reads, "This stone was laid by the Lord Bishop of North Queensland The Rt Rev Ian Shevill M.A. 5th July 1953 - A.M.D.G. A.E. Turner Rector".

• A plaque on the adjacent Hall reads, A Joint Initiative of St Thomas Anglican Church, Hughenden Flinders Shire Council and The Estate of Charles Smith (Smithy) Duncombe. Officially Dedicated by The Anglican Bishop of North Queensland The Right Reverend Bill Ray 8th July 2012.

- Yorke Island is only 2.7 km long and 800 m wide and is presently very vulnerable to the encroachment of the sea because of the low elevation.
- The shape of the church building is very much the basic traditional style with a rectangle beneath a corrugated iron gable roof, and a porch at the front and a shallow apse at the rear. The apse has three windows containing some coloured glass.



## Rev Florence Li Tim-Oi

In a move which showed that there are times when pastoral care trumps theology, January 25, 1944 saw Bishop Ronald Hall, the Anglican Missionary Bishop of Hong Kong and China, ordain the first female priest in the Anglican Communion, Florence Li Tim-Oi.

He had previously written to the Archbishop of Canterbury, William Temple, advising him that "I have given her permission to celebrate the Lord's Supper. If I could reach her physically I should ordain her priest rather than give her permission ... I'm not an advocate for the ordination of women. I am, however, determined that no prejudices should prevent the congregations committed to my care having the sacraments of the Church."





What a great surprise to see the display at Cathedral on last month. Many ladies keep their wedding dress for long time providing good care. One of dress was worn by 3 generations. It is certainly a family treasure.

The Japanese also wear white kimono at the wedding ceremony (However, many brides now choose the western style white

dress. But either way, we change to wear a colourful dress for the reception



Japanese women also wear white by tradition as white has connotations such as "purification", "pureness", "innocence" and to invoke the "sacred" light of the Japanese Sun God (Shinto religion). In Christian tradition, white also attributes the religious doctrine of virgin sanctity. In the ancient traditions of Japan, the white costume also signifies the "rebirth" of death. It is still common to wear a white kimono at your own funeral service for burial or cremation.

• I do not believe that the modern Japanese world now fully embraces this traditional concept. Yet, white is the symbolic wedding colour of change for entering one's marriage and acceptance of your partner's family. In this meaning, I like the symbolism of wearing a white wedding dress.

Ya?

"..... My wedding photos show my traditional wedding kimono and headdress. For our wedding reception, I changed into a colourful kimono. Many family members wore a traditional black kimono with family crest displayed on the chests and back.

#### One more tradition which my husband fond of!

I wore a "Tsunokakushi (direct translation: "Hiding Horns"), which is a type of traditional wedding kimono headdress worn by brides in during the Shinto wedding ceremony. Growing "horns" is a symbol of anger. So, by hiding them, one can become an obedient and docile wife. It is said that if a woman goes mad with jealousy, she will become a horned demon, so the headdress is worn to hide the "horns of jealousy



## ST. JAMES' GATHEDRAL, TOWNSVILLE.

#### (FROM OUR SPRCIAL REPORTER.)

Townsville, October 27.

THE opening of St. James' Cathedral at Townsville, which took place to-day, marks an era in the annals of the Kng ish Church in North Queen-land, and bef re proceeding to the actual opening cer monies, a retrospective glance at the h story of the church in Townsvi le from its earliest days to the present time is a pleasura le u de taking from the fart of the satisfactory development which has slowly and sur ly obtained as a result of the steadfast labors of those who had the best interests of their church at heart. To none is more redit due than to His Lordship Bishop Stan on for the position of the church to-day, his unflag ing zeal and disinterested exertions having endeared him to the diocese, which was in his care between the 24th of June, 1878, and the 15th of January, 1891.

### Townsville Cathedral

Residents of Townsville, irrespective of class or creed (says the Bulletin), cannot but be proud of the fact that St. James's Church of England Cathedral, which was consecrated on. October 27 by the Right Rev. Bishop Barlow, is essentially a North Queensland structure.

For that portion of the cathedral which was opened yesterday the diocese of North Queensland is indebted to its first bishop, the much venerated Bishop Stanton, who now has charge of the diocese of Newcastle, New South Wales.

In 1884, five years after his arrival in North Queensland, Bishop Stanton promulgated the idea of the building of a cathedral, and although at the time the project was deemed by many persons to be premature, such was the determination of its originator, so large his individual liberality and so powerful his influence, that on June 21, 1887—the jubilee of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria—Bishop Stanton, with due ceremony, turned the first sod of the excavation for the foundation. All the details had been well thought out, and it needed only a clever organiser and controlling master mind to carry the ambitious scheme to a successful issue by securing enthusiastic support. At the meeting of the Synod on January 15, 1891, the resignation of Bishop Stanton of the see of North Queensland was accepted, and he was in due course translated to that of Newcastle.


Bishop Barlow, who was unanimously elected as his successor at the same sitting of the Synod, has pushed on the building to its present stage with characteristic energy, sparing no personal exertion in order to secure the consummation of the project inaugurated by his predecessor. It is due to Bishop Barlow that the opening of the cathedral has been celebrated at a much earlier date than was at first anticipated

Bishop Stanton communicated to Mr. Arthur Blackett, of Sydney, all the special features required in such a structure in a tropical climate, and in February, 1885, Mr. Blackett paid a visit to Townsville, inspected the proposed site, and examined the material then proposed to be used-namely, the reddish gray sandstone from Bungaree Creek, on the Northern Railway. Having acquired full knowledge of the dimensions of the proposed building Mr. Blackett returned to Sydney, and in a few months supplied two designs—one in Italian Gothic with a large central dome, the estimated cost of which was £35,000, and the other in the neo-Norman style of architecture of cruciform plan, with an apse at the east and a tower at the west end to carry a peal of bells, and a fleche at the intersection of the transepts for ventilation purposes. "With certain modifications" this latter design was accepted, the question of cost preventing the use of the beautiful sandstone, and necessitating the adoption of brick. The estimated cost of the approved design was £24,000; or without the top of the tower and fiecho, £20,000; or with partial tower, nave, and transepts, without the choir, £14,000. The choir and transepts were estimated to cost £10,000; the fiecho and decorations, £300; top of the tower, £3,300; and fences, stops, &c., £400. That portion of the cathedral which was opened on Thursday consists of the apse, choir, and transepts, the western end being temporarily bricked in.

Standing in an elevated position at the corner of Cleveland Terrace and Hamilton Street, the cathedral overlooks the busiest portion of the town. The main entrance is at the west end, which is approached by an incline from the side of the old church. When the building is finished the west entrance will be high above the level of Cleveland Terrace, to which steps will lead down.

The floor of the nave will then be sufficiently high from the ground to allow a crypt, in which will be located a system of fans for the diffusion of cold air throughout the building.

#### OPENING OF ST. JAMES' CATHEDRAL, TOWNSVILLE. (FROM OUR SPECIAL REPORTER.) TOWNSVILLE, October 27.

THE opening of St. James' Cathedral at Townsville, which took place to-day, marks an era in the annals of the English Church in North Queensland, and before proceeding to the actual opening ceremonies, a retrospective glance at the history of the church in Townsville from its earliest days to the present time is a pleasurable undertaking from the fact of the satisfactory development which has slowly and surely obtained as a result of the steadfast labors of those who had the best interests of their church at heart. To none is more credit due than to His Lordship Bishop Stanton for the position of the church to-day, his unflagging zeal and disinterested exertions having endeared him to the diocese, which was in his care between the 24th of June, 1878, and the 15th of January, 1891.

In the earliest days, when Townsville formed part of the Sydney diocese, services were conducted in the old Court House, by Mr James Gordon, and it was in 1866 that the first incumbent was appointed, the Rev. James Adams. In 1871 the erection of the building known as St James' Pro-Cathedral was commenced. and it was upon the first Sunday in October of that year that the first service was held therein. Nearly seven years later, namely, in June 1878. The Rev. G. H. Stanton D.D. was consecrated the first Bishop of North Queensland, but he did not proceed direct to his new diocese. He spent some months in England, during which, with a full realisation of the state of the country he was going to, and the many hardships and difficulties he would have to face—he devoted his time to the obtaining of funds for Church purposes, and in the setting together of a class of clergymen suitable for his requirements. It was not then until May 1879 that he landed in Townsville, upon the 21st of which month he preached his first sermon to a Townsville

congregation, and to the credit of the town it may be said that that congregation was a very large one. Upon Bishop Stanton's active and useful life in North Queensland we need not here further dilate, but in 1884 he first announced the idea which he had conceived of building a cathedral church at Townsville, but the plan required considerable time to mature, and the matter of ways and means was one which has of course to be taken into account. Upon 21st of June, however, in 1887 (Jubilee Day), the first sod of the excavations of the cathedral was turned, since which time the building has been proceeded with up to the present time, and though not yet completed, it is in every way a credit to those who have devised and carried it out, as well as to the town. The original architect was Mr Arthur Blackett, of Sydney, and the local superintending architect. Mr Eyre, of the firm of Eyre and Munro. The contractors are Messrs McMahon and Cliffe, and the cost up to the present time has been about £10,000. Two designs were submitted by Mr Blackett, one in Italian Gothic with large central dome, at an estimated cost of £35,000, and the other in a semi-Norman style of architecture, with an apse at the east and tower at the western extremity. The latter, with certain alterations and modifications, was adopted. The portion of the cathedral, which was to-day opened, was the apse, chancel and transepts, the western end being left unfinished, where the building will subsequently be finished by the additional of tower, &c., and when completed the cathedral will be decidedly a most imposing edifice. Coming to the interior, the width of the building across the transepts is 94ft, and the width of the transepts is 23ft 4in. The length from the apse to the present western door is 84ft, the width of the apse being 34ft 6in.

The pillars, which were specially exhibited at the Melbourne Exhibition, are the largest castings ever made in Australia, and the weight of the four central ones is six tons apiece, the intermediate ones being about two tons' weight. The pulpit, which is manufactured entirely from Queensland woods by Messrs McMahon and Cliffe, is the gift of the clergy of the diocese in memory of Bishop Stanton's episcopate. The brass lectern of the pulpit was turned out by Mr Horn, of the firm of Horn and Petersen. The stalls for the canons are the gift of the Mayor of Townsville Mr C. F. Sparre. The organ was the gift of Miss Holland, a friend of Bishop Stanton's in England, some years ago, but in the Pro-Cathedral it was unable to be allotted such a position as would do it justice.

Yesterday, however, it was heard to great advantage, its splendid volume of tone filling the building beautifully. There is extensive seating capacity, and the Cathedral today was comfortably filled, a large proportion of the congregation being ladies.

The opening ceremonies commenced at noon, the profession leaving Bishop's Lodge punctually at that hour in the following order, the choir singing hymn 215 "The Church's one foundation Verger.

On arrival at the western door, the procession separated into two lines, and the Bishop passing up to the entrance, and having gone through the forms of service set for the occasion, knocked at the door, saying:

"Open ye the Gates," and entering, said: "Peace be unto You."

Canon Edwards then presented the petition for consecration,
saying: "My Lord, in the name of the Diocese, I desire that you
will be pleased to consecrate this Cathedral to the uses set forth
in this petition."

The Registrar then read the petition, the Bishop answering "I am ready to do as you desire, and I pray

God to bless and prosper this our work."

The Bishop, Canons, and others with the choir then proceeded to the chancel singing Psalm XXIV, and after prayers had been said, the work of consecration was performed by the Bishop, with Canons Edwards, Tucker and White and the Revd. W. A. Turner, proceeding first to the front and then in order, to the Lectern, the Pulpit, the place of marriage, and the place of confirmation. The Bishop then, standing before the Holy table, offered up prayer for all who should herereafter worship within the building, and, then sitting in his chair, and the congregation also being seated, the Chancellor of the Diocese read the sentence of consecration, which was afterwards signed by his Lordship, and the choir sang Hymn No. 160.

Here followed the order of Holy communion, and after the Nicene creed, the Bishop gave a brief but eloquent address from the pulpit. He thanked God from his heart that the church in North Queensland was able to say that it had arrived at the position of that day, and he rejoiced with his congregation upon the opening of the building in which they were then assembled.

The cathedral, however, must not be looked upon as for Townsville alone, but as an object of pride to every son and daughter of the church from end to end of North. Queensland. The hour of opening had necessarily, in conformation to the rules of the church, been fixed at an hour which was not very convenient to all, but he rejoiced to see so large a congregation on the occasion.

He had received a letter from Bishop Stanton a day or two ago, who spoke with regret that he could not personally be present at the opening ceremony, but he had said "My heart and thoughts

will be with you on Thursday."

Going on, Bishop Barlow reverted to over 20 years ago, when he had rejoiced upon the opening of the limited building which had supplied their wants from then up till now. He noticed some around who had been present upon that occasion, and he feelingly spoke also of the number then present who had since passed away forever. He concluded by

inviting the congregation to join in the partaking of the Holy Communion. The choir sang hymn No. 360 during the offertory, the letter resulting in the collection of over £182.
