During the month we were once again reminded why the MtS is so important for the wellbeing of international seafarers, when members of a ship were treated poorly by their crewing agency overseas. The Mission has a service to agents to transfer seafarers to and from medical appointments, hotels, and airport which we offer daily. Unfortunately, there remain some shipping companies that treat their crew with little respect, and we had another example in April. On this occasion, on-signing crew were housed in a motel with no food services, while the off-signing crew destined to be taken to Townsville Airport 13 hours before their flight with no expenses for food. The Mission came to the rescue providing breakfast and lunch, and a place to sleep during the day. The group ended their stay with us playing pool before being driver to the airport three hours before their flight. Thankfully, we confirmed that upon arrival at their next destination, Melbourne at 11pm, the crew were taken to overnight accommodation until their next flights the following afternoon. We contacted the International Transport Federation about what we saw was a breach of care by the shipping company. It is important that when we see these things happening, we contact the relevant organisations.



### Let's look at some HISTORY

## Reopeni Cathedral



After a lot of damage to St James' Cathedraland the (sub-) Deanery during cyclone 'Leonta' in March, 1903, a grand opening was held to re-open

the cathedral



The ceremony in connection with the re-opening of the Townsville Cathedral after its restoration took place this morning. There was a most brilliant assemblage. Judge Chubb the Chancellor of the Cathedral, appeared in his robes. The service took place at 7.15 a.m.

There was a very large congregation and many communicants. Excellent music was rendered by a large choir and orchestra. At the Communion service the celebrant was the Bishop of the Diocese. The Epistoler was the Sub-Dean, and the Gospeller, the Archdeacon of North Queensland. The ceremony opened with the Processional Hymn, "Hail Festal Day".

## eonta Cathedral Reopeni Cyclone

Following was the order of the procession:—

The Churchwardens, the Lay Members of the Chapter, the Cross Bearer, the Choir, the Readers, the Clergy according to the date of Ordination, the Canons, the Archdeacon of Mackay, the Archdeacon of North Queensland, the Archdeacon of Wide Bay and Burnett, representing the Diocese of Brisbane, the Bishop of Carpentaria and his Chaplain, the Bishop of North Queensland preceded by Staff Bearer, and followed by his Chaplain, the Chancellor, the Primate, proceeded by his Staff Bearer and followed by his Chaplains.

After the Collect, the Epistle and the Gospel had been read and the Nicene Creed chanted, the Bishop read the Prayer of Sanctification and the Prayers for the Diocese and the Rejoicing for the Restoration. Then holding in his left hand the pastoral staff, he read the authority of restoration and suitable passage of Scripture. His Lordship, sitting in his chair, directed the Chancellor of the Diocese to read publicly the sentence of restoration. This having been done, the Bishop signed it and ordered it to be deposited in the Bishop's Registry. The service of the Holy Communion was then proceeded with and the alms collected will be devoted to the Cathedral restoration fund. The Primate and other Bishops present presented their offerings kneeling at the Holy Table. After the prayer of the Consecration, a suitable hymn was rendered and then His Grace the Primate read a Prayer and the Bishop, taking in his band the pastoral staff, pronounce the Blessing and the Nunc Dimittis was chanted. The procession again proceeded in the order stated above.

### Leonta Reopenin Cyclone Cathedral

A breakfast in the Jubilee Hall followed. His Lordship Bishop Frodsham presided. In the course of a speech he said the restoration was a wonderful example of the the Australian church in adversity. He relied upon the strong, growing young church in Australia and his reliance was not in vain, though the home church was generous and sympathetic, yet three times the amount of help came from Australia. Southern Queensland was the first to help the Mayor's Fund and the Church funds after the cyclone. Civil jealousies had disappeared in the common brotherhood, and State and provincial unity had thus been developed by disaster. The presence of the Primate, the Bishop of Carpentaria and Archdeacon Rivers, representing

Brisbane, visibly indicated the unity. His Grace the Primate said that, personally, he was the visible symbol of unity. The Australian Church had the deepest sympathy and friendliness for North Queensland. He was quickened by the esteem for his old purple friend, Bishop Frodsham. The disaster plainly showed that the hand of God works for ultimate good.

The Bishop of Carpentaria spoke affectionately about his old Diocese. The dignified service that morning appealed to him deeply. The Cathedral was now better and more beautiful than in the past. He remembered the honoured names of Bishop Stanton, and the late Canon Edwards. Ven. Archdeacon Rivers said that the interest of the Brisbane Diocese had been

growing for North Queensland. He testified to the real sympathy of not a few, but many, of the southerners. The Bishops, Archdeacons Garland and Day, and the Rev. Best, all hailed from the Brisbane Diocese.

Everything was now binding the North and South in unity.

Mr. Justice Chubb congratulated the Bishop and all concerned on the happy result.

To-night a thanksgiving service will be held. The Primate preaches.

### Early to rise act of faith

A new analysis suggests that being religious may contribute to a previously established link between preferring to wake up early and having higher life satisfaction.

Researchers say this relationship may, in turn, be influenced by a person's level of conscientiousness.

The team conducted two survey-based analyses of Polish adults, one with 500 participants and the other with 728 participants.

Both groups completed questionnaires to evaluate their preference for mornings, their life satisfaction and their level of conscientiousness.

One group was asked about their belief in God and the other about their level of religiosity in general.

The survey reaffirmed that being a morning person is associated with higher conscientiousness and life satisfaction, and also suggested that being religious is associated with a preference for mornings.
